y work is aimed to position literal images in linear yet

practical and potent juxtapositions. The power that the literal image has when representing subject matter rooted in conflict is that each viewer has an interpretation that can potentially be drastically opposed from the other. My work has a tendency to reinforce stereotypes while challenging personal ideologies simultaneously. I thoughtfully select source material that could be viewed with a heavy subjective opinion of matters. Then by drawing the images on the chalkboard with an ephemeral and temporal material like chalk allows the work to be didactic in nature and metaphorically in flux.

Some of my drawings are a representation of important decisions associated with self. The drawings confront the psychological, spiritual, emotional and physical turmoil one may experience throughout life and the

possible succumbing or strength that can be discovered in the resolution of those confrontations. The

viewer is encouraged to empathetically and reflectively identify with the subject matter and gaze the work possesses.

Other drawings, especially those that are more political in nature are positioned to create a juxtaposition of power exchanges politically and culturally. These drawings have a tendency to reinforce stereotypes, challenge personal ideologies or see struggle. They are to be experienced historically, culturally and interpreted personally.
