ABOUT DR. STACY YOUNG



tacy H. Young took office July 1, 2023, as the 16th president of Manchester University and the second female to serve in this role. A 1996 Manchester graduate, Dr. Young came home after serving most of her career in Michigan. The opportunity to lead her alma mater and the institution that started her passion for higher education was a dream come true.

While she was in high school, an accounting teacher, Marvene Pippenger, encouraged Dr. Young to attend Manchester. Dr. Young still considers it one of the most important decisions in her life.

This transformational time in college continues to be the reason Dr. Young encourages students to "lean in" to college life and take advantage of new opportunities and campus events. Dr. Young and her twin sister, Tracy, were aerobics instructors, orientation leaders, disc jockeys for the college WBKE radio station, campus tour

guides, took part in academic clubs, and even worked in admissions. These extra opportunities were some of the reasons their résumés stood out to prospective employers.

After leaving Manchester in 1996 with a degree in accounting, Dr. Young worked as an internal auditor and later for private businesses. Immediately following graduation, Dr. Young attended Bethel University, where she earned a master's degree in business administration in 1998.

While working a full-time job using her accounting skills, she also taught as an adjunct for five years. During this time, she fell in love with teaching and working with students. Dr. Young worked as a full-time accounting and business faculty member, later department chair, dean, and president at Michigan colleges. In 2013, she completed a Doctor of Philosophy in Leadership from Andrews University.

As president at Montcalm Community College in Michigan, Dr. Young served on many state and local boards, including an appointment by the governor to the Michigan Education Trust Board. Dr. Young has been an active Rotarian as well as, serving the community. In 2023, she won the Spirt of Collaboration Award from the Greenville, Mich., Chamber of Commerce. Dr. Young led an effort at her college to perform more than 10,000 hours of community service.

In addition to her work in the community, she successfully grew departments, divisions, campuses, and an entire college through unique enrollment strategies.

Between them, Dr. Young and husband Ron have five children and seven grandchildren. Their grown children live in Chicago, Indianapolis and Cincinnati. Two of their children are still at home. Allison will graduate from college this fall and Max is a high school senior who intends to attend Manchester in the fall of 2024. In their free time, the couple enjoys spending time with family, walking, running, and serving the community.

ABOUT MANCHESTER UNIVERSITY



Manchester University traces its origin to the Roanoke Classical Seminary founded by the United Brethren Church in Roanoke, Ind., in 1860. The seminary became Manchester College when it was moved to North Manchester, Ind., in 1889. Representatives of the Church of the Brethren purchased the campus in 1895 and deeded it to four State Districts of the Church in 1902. The number of supporting districts increased and, by 1932, Manchester served the five-state area of Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin.

Rapid growth of the public high school and increasing interest in higher education resulted in a gradual shift of emphasis from an academy and Bible school to a college of liberal arts. The academy was discontinued in 1923.

Mount Morris College in Mount Morris, Ill., merged with Manchester College in 1932. Founded as a Methodist seminary in 1839, Mount Morris had been purchased by representatives of the Church of the Brethren in 1879 and operated under the name of the Rock River Seminary and College Institute until 1884, when the name was changed to Mount Morris College.


The relationship of Manchester University with the Church of the Brethren continues. The University accents this relationship and welcomes students of all faiths to its campus.

In July 2012, Manchester College became Manchester University, and in August 2012, opened a second location in Fort Wayne, Ind., home to the University's graduate and professional programs in the health sciences.

THE PRESIDENTIAL MEDALLION

During the inauguration ceremony,
Chair of the Board of Trustees John
Gilmore will present the Presidential
Medallion to President Young. The
silver-plated bronze medallion is a
symbol of the office Dr. Young has
been called to serve. Throughout her
tenure, she will wear it in all academic
processions and other ceremonial
occasions.

The Presidential Medallion is 3½ inches in diameter, supported by a necklace of 23 silver-plated discs. President Young's name and the names of Manchester's 15 previous presidents are engraved on discs — a reminder of Manchester's heritage of leadership.



The medallion itself bears the University Seal, which illustrates the values of learning, faith and service.

BRASS QUINTET



The brass quintet performing for today's ceremony consists of members from the Manchester Symphony Orchestra. With about 6,000 residents, North Manchester is one of the smallest communities in the nation with its own symphony orchestra. Residents of Wabash County and what was then Manchester College founded the symphony in 1939. That partnership continues today with a carefully crafted collaboration of professional and community musicians, as

well as selected Manchester faculty, staff and student musicians. Manchester University is proud of its longstanding relationship with the MSO, now celebrating its 85th season.

Members of the brass quintet are Gilmar Cavalcante, trumpet; Steve Hammer, trumpet; Mathew Weidner, French horn; Jose Roman, trombone; and Terry Solomonson, Tuba.



KELLY SCHROCK AND EMILY SCHROCK

Kelly and Emily Schrock, sister and niece of Dr. Young, will be singing a song meaningful to her. Kelly has been singing since high school at various venues, most often at her church. She teaches music at Jefferson Elementary in the Middlebury (Ind.) Community Schools system. Emily is a junior at Ball State University studying speech-language pathology. A talented musician, she is the principal flutist

for the Ball State Wind Ensemble and often sings at her church. Kelly and Emily live in Goshen, Ind., with their family, Kyle and Abby.

A CAPPELLA CHOIR

Conducted by Professor of Music Debra Lynn, A Cappella Choir is an auditioned ensemble that maintains 40-50 members and is open to all Manchester students, regardless of their major field of study. In fact, most of the singers in A Cappella Choir are not music majors. Standard choral repertoire is performed during tours and on-campus concert programs. The choir tours each year after commencement

ceremonies in the spring. Tours have included performances at Carnegie Hall in New York and the Vatican in Rome, in addition to other prestigious venues.



THE SPARTAN PRIDE MARCHING BAND

Established in 2020, The Spartan Pride Marching Band's first season was hampered by COVID-19 and the cancellation of MU's football schedule. The Spartan Pride (a.k.a. "Sound of Manchester") however, was able to line up some halftime performances at local high schools and "hit the ground marching" the following fall. Since then, the band has performed at all home games, numerous campus events and

high schools throughout the region. This fall, the group will enter the inaugural Metallica "For Whom the Band Tolls" national marching band competition.

Students from various majors across campus make up The Spartan Pride. The band is under the leadership of Scott Humphries, director of bands and music education.
