In that context, how one dentist emphasized quantity during the second week affected Kendal deeply, leading her to ask many questions and only find some answers. The experience increased her already strong empathy with patients. In summary, Kendal has surpassed many obstacles so far in her journey to becoming a dentist. After graduating with a B.S. in Biology-Chemistry, Kendal will continue her studies this fall at Indiana University School of Dentistry. I know her patients will appreciate the high-quality care, empathy and hard work she will provide.
