

Traditionally the T2T candidates were placed in undergraduate courses held during the school day, and therefore, were able to participate in clinical experiences. However, in order to serve more candidates working full-time, as well as help fill the vacancies in teaching, the EPP now offers their T2T program all online, and therefore, does not require clinical experience in accordance with their courses. However, teacher candidates are trained in the pedagogy of teaching and during their student teaching phase (whether they are the teacher of record or not), candidates are evaluated by a member of the EPP.

Candidates in our T2T program take courses to prepare them for teaching students of diverse backgrounds. EDUC 411: The Diverse Adolescent Learner enables the classroom teacher to create an engaging classroom environment that considers all learners. It considers the unique needs of adolescent learners including exceptionalities, varying socioeconomic status, and new speakers of English. EDUC 413 Theories of Motivation and Engagement develops an understanding of the major concepts and theories related to the social, emotional, physical, cognitive, linguistic, and moral development of adolescent learners. EDUC 423: Developing an Equitable Classroom focuses on creating a classroom environment that considers the needs of all members of the learning community. It exams bias and hidden curriculum so that all learners are given equitable education. Additionally, we meet twice a year with our community stakeholders to receive input and guidance as we refine our program to meet the needs of our communities and

the learners in the area. The faculty in our unit works closely with the Indiana State Teachers Association, CAEP, Indiana Department of Education, Indiana Association for Colleges of Teacher Education, and the Association of Teacher Educators to stay abreast of what is current and needed in schools.



Across the education classes, the integration of technology is modeled and expected. In the special education courses, various forms of assistive technology are explored. This assures preparation of teachers not only for the use of technology, but for its use pertaining to universal design for learning applications, too. In addition, we have a SMART interactive whiteboard in one of our education-designated classrooms and faculty frequently demonstrate 1:1 with the elementary education candidates. Faculty and candidates are learning to use the technology. All candidates are expected to integrate technology into lesson plans as appropriate for maximum engagement of their students. During the literacy course required of all majors, teacher candidates are required to modify one lesson plan in their unit as an e-learning lesson. All teacher candidates take Theories of Motivation and Engagement where they examine assessment data available to teachers and use statistical knowledge necessary to understand, analyze, and use that data for the purpose of planning future instruction. In addition, faculty often integrate some of these ideas into their own courses so students become more familiar and comfortable using different technology. Finally, most of the clinical experience placements are 1:1 or have a wide variety of technology infused in instruction. Since most school corporations are also turning to e-learning, we are exploring ways to integrate this pedagogy and curriculum design into the EPP's courses. The EPP requires an e-learning lesson as part of the unit plan. The EPP is taking steps to provide students with deeper knowledge and experience in integrating technology effectively.

The EPP requires all teaching candidates to take the foundational course in special education (The Diverse Adolescent Learner). As they develop curriculum throughout their teaching programs, they must adapt individual lessons to meet the needs of exceptional learners. Teaching candidates are evaluated in clinical experiences and student teaching on their ability to differentiate instruction. Student teachers must implement adaptations throughout their placements.

This is an area the EPP recognizes as an area for improvement. T2T candidates are not licensed in special education, however, working with students with differing abilities is integrated into their coursework in all required courses. However, due to school corporations' policies and interpretation of the federal law regarding team members and confidentiality, there is not a consistent or planned opportunity to participate in IEP team meetings. The EPP is exploring training provided through videos or a virtual platform.

c. Effectively teach students who are limited English proficient.

The T2T program does not require a specific course on teaching students with limited English proficiency; however, it does integrate strategies for teaching students with limited English proficiency in the required disciplinary literacy course. This course requires teaching candidates to teach a lesson adapted to accommodate K-12 students with limited English proficiency. Additionally, the T2T teaching candidates complete a course in creating culturally responsive classrooms.
